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FROM THE DESK OF MR. MOSES

I continue to be impressed with the teachers' level of adaptability as we navigate through the implementation of the Common Core Learning Standards and their level of professionalism as we continue with our development of more dynamic and effective instructional strategies. I am equally impressed and inspired by our students' ability to step up to the challenge of more rigorous standards and expectations to produce artifacts of learning that have exceeded initial expectations. Even more inspiring is the students' enthusiasm and excitement exhibited when they are engaged in authentic learning experiences.

The Middle-High School faculties continue to develop their working knowledge of student data and relate it to student understanding and performance on assessments. The development of knowledge in our teaching staff comes from the implementation of a data-driven instructional model as well as by evaluating historical data of our students over time. I am extremely proud to report that our Math and English 3-8 NYS assessment proficiency rates (level 3 or 4) have increased by 7% from 2013 to 2014. The 7% increase in proficiency rates ranks Forestville second among the twenty-seven (27) districts in our BOCES region.

From June 2013 to June 2014 our High School Regents results have also shown a rather positive trend. NYS Regents Exam results showed a 6% increase in proficiency rates (65% +) while our mastery rates (85% +) have increased by 4% in one year. The High School's proficiency and mastery rates have shown a steady increase over the last four years (pictured below).



Although we continue to be very encouraged by the assessment data and the trends that we see, we also realize that our work is nowhere complete. The Common Core Standards with matching assessments are now being implemented at the High School level (Algebra I - 2014, Geometry - 2015, Comprehensive English, Algebra II - 2016). The Common Core Social Studies standards and assessments are in the final stages of approval while the State is expected to make a decision regarding the development of new Science standards.

FROM THE DESK OF MR. MOSES CONT'D



As Forestville continues to make progress in student achievement scores, we also continue to search for additional opportunities in programming for our students which will aid in the process of preparing them for their futures. Two such programs are the P-TECH STEM College and Career Academy in conjunction with Erie II BOCES and the HURI SURI (BAMA) molecular biology program in partnership with Jamestown Community College. Both programs are early in the planning stages - but please stay tuned as more information will become available as details are finalized in each program.

"The P-TECH WNY STEM College & Career Academy will offer a place-based differentiated learning culture with specialized educators working in tandem with higher education, business partners and component school districts to support students as they obtain a NYS Regents Diploma and AAS in Mechanical Technology (with specializations available in pre-engineering design or precision machining) or Welding in addition to several certifications through CTE."

"The High School Undergraduate Research Initiative/Science Undergraduate Research Initiative (HURI SURI) provides equipment and supplies to high schools so that they can teach an innovative college level first semester biology course called Biology: A Molecular Approach (BAMA). The focus will be on helping students understand science as a process. They will be able to perform real world research and witness firsthand the interdisciplinary nature of science.

We will continue to reach out to neighboring districts, to work closely with our BOCES partners and work to develop alternative means of offering high-quality programming for the students and families of the Forestville School District. This is a district and community that is known for its small-town feel, a caring and supportive community and a group of hard-working families who will do what it takes to get the job done. Although we are facing several new challenges in education today (as in other fields), I am confident that through the continued hard work and dedication of our faculty, staff and students, in collaboration with families and the greater community, we will be able to provide a sustainable and thriving local educational program which will establish the foundation necessary for our students' next step in their life journey. This foundation will enable our students to become true competitors in today's global market.

Now that most of the winter weather is behind us, or at least we hope that it is, we draw our attention to the NYS Assessments coming up in April. Our students in grades 3-8 have a rich history of doing well on these assessments. In the Spring of 2013, all students across New York State participated in the newly developed assessment program. The new assessments were made more rigorous and aligned to the new Common Core State Standards (CCSS). The Commissioner of Education for NYS encouraged all schools to review the results and to regard them as a baseline to compare future years' results.

Forestville CSD is proud to announce that in the second year of this new assessment, our 3-8 students scored the second most growth out of the 27 schools in Erie 2 BOCES! When averaging all 3-8 students who scored proficient in both ELA and Math, our scores increased by 7% over last year's results. That is an amazing accomplishment! We are so proud of our students and teachers! However, as you can well imagine, we are not resting on these results and saying that we cannot do better. In fact, we know that we can do even better this year! With another year of teaching aligned to the CCSS, our students will have more tools and exercise greater proficiency as they participate this year.

Senior Winter Checklist

- Work together to apply for financial aid. Have your child contact the financial aid offices at the colleges he or she is interested in to find out what forms students must submit to apply for aid. Make sure he or she applies for aid by or before any stated deadlines. Funds are limited, so the earlier you apply, the better.
- Fill out the FAFSA to apply for aid. The government and many colleges use the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) to award aid. Now it's easier than ever to fill out this form because you can automatically transfer your tax information online from the IRS to the FAFSA.
- Learn about college loan options together. Borrowing money for college can be a smart choice especially if your high schooler gets a low-interest federal loan. Learn more about the parent's role in borrowing money.

Junior Winter Checklist

- Review PSAT/NMSQT results together. Your child's score report comes with a free SAT study plan. This
 online, customized plan is based on your child's test scores and can help him or her work on areas that
 need improvement. Learn more about this individualized SAT study plan.
- Help your child prepare for college admission tests. Many juniors take college admission tests, such as the SAT and the ACT, in the spring so they can get a head start on planning for college. See which tests your high school junior may need to take.
- Discuss taking challenging courses next year. Taking college-level or honors courses as a senior can help
 your child prepare for college work and these are also the courses that college admission officers like to
 see. Learn more about advanced classes.

Sophomore Winter Checklist

- Review PSAT/NMSQT or PLAN results together. Your child's score report indicates his or her academic strengths and weaknesses. Review the report together and talk about ways to improve in areas that need attention. If your child took the PSAT/NMSQT, help him or her log in to My College QuickStart to get personalized feedback based on his or her PSAT/NMSQT score report.

Financial Aid Checklist for Students and Parents of the Class of 2015

Use this checklist as a personal record and as a reminder of the steps to take to obtain financial aid.

If you are in doubt as to whether or not to apply for aid, apply! Do not wait for college acceptance letters before filing for aid. File in January or February —the earlier the better. You do not need to have completed your 2014 tax returns prior to filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) ---use the information from your 2013 tax return. An estimate of income and/or income tax information is adequate. You cannot file the FAFSA until after Jan. 1, but complete it before Feb. 1 if at all possible.

- Get worksheets to fill out prior to filing the FAFSA at www.fafsa.ed.gov. You and your parents will both need a PIN, or electronic password, before completing the form available at www.pin.ed.gov. It's a good idea to get your PIN in advance, although PINs can still be obtained during the FAFSA sign-up process.
- Complete income tax forms as soon as possible in order to provide accurate data on financial aid forms. Some colleges have early February deadlines.
- Make a list of the financial aid priority dates and deadlines at the colleges to which you are applying. Ask each college if it requires supplemental forms, and obtain them as needed.
- Apply for federal and state funds by answering the appropriate questions on the FAFSA.
- Check for scholarships for which you might be eligible:
 - -Each college/postsecondary institution (your best source)
 - -Those posted in the counseling office
 - -Local and state scholarships

Details to remember:

- In all written communications to financial aid offices, put your name, address, and date of birth on every page.
- Keep your financial aid worksheets.
- Always make photocopies of your financial aid forms for your records.
- If you have questions about an item, do not guess. See your counselor or speak with the college financial aid officer directly.
- Do not leave blank spaces on the forms. Use zeros instead.
- Proofread!
- And again, make photocopies of everything!

If you properly complete the FAFSA, you will receive a Student Aid Report (SAR) that will provide your eligibility index for federal and state aid. If there are errors or incorrect information on the SAR, you can make corrections online. Financial aid offers are sent by colleges either with, or shortly after you receive, a letter of acceptance. You will be asked to sign an acceptance of the amount received, and the money will be sent to the college/postsecondary institution. Stop by or call the guidance office if you have any questions.

The *Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program* will host a walk-in site at Forestville Central School on Saturday, February 14, 2015 from 10AM - 2PM. Bring valid photo ID, Social Security cards for all on the return, wage statements, any 1099s you receive, 1095-A, B or C Health Insurance verification, and all other tax forms with you.

The *Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program* helps income-eligible people file their federal and New York State tax returns for free, and claim the Earned Income Tax Credit. If you worked in 2014, but earned less than \$53,000, you may be eligible for the Earned Income Tax Credit - even if you are not required to file an income tax return! IRS-certified volunteers can help you file your tax returns for free, and help you claim the refund that you are entitled to.


1984-1985 Champion Hornets Relive the Magic

Middle and High School Reading: Tips for Students

The keys to becoming a successful reader in middle and high school include learning organization skills and sophisticated reading strategies.

- 1. Create an organization system at home. Keep binders neat and have a file for completed papers.
- **2. Practice reading.** Read every day and particularly during the summer the more practice the better; it doesn't matter what genre you read, just make sure you are reading.
- **3. Reading tips for textbooks:** Read questions at the end of the chapter first; use headings and subheadings as cues.
- **4. Spend time in middle school developing good reading strategies.** When you get to high school, teachers are more likely to concentrate on the content rather than on developing reading skills.

Change To This Year's School Calendar

A change to the 2014-2015 school calendar has been made in order to recover one of the instructional days lost due to emergency school closings. Friday, March 6, 2015 has been designated as a half day of student attendance for the Elementary School only. Dismissal will be at 11:30 at the Elementary School. This day was previously designated as a full-day Superintendent's Conference Day with no student attendance. There will still be no student attendance at the Middle/High School on March 6th.

At this time, the remainder of the 2014-2015 school calendar remains the same. Depending on future weather circumstances, the calendar may be subject to additional changes.

Are you receiving the STAR credit on your school taxes?

If you own property and it is your primary residence, you are probably eligible for a STAR school property tax exemption. To receive your exemption all you have to do is complete an application which you may obtain from your local assessor's office or download from www.tax.ny.gov. Return the completed form to your local assessor by March 1st. The assessor may require proof of residency and ownership.

2 TYPES OF STAR EXEMPTION:

- 1) The <u>Basic STAR</u> exemption is available for owner-occupied, primary residences for owners who are 64 years old or younger. Basic STAR works by exempting the first \$30,000 of the full market value of a home from school taxes. To be eligible for the Basic STAR, the maximum adjustable gross income limit is \$500,000.

 You may need to re-apply for the basic STAR exemption. All taxpayers eligible for the Basic STAR exemption were required to complete a registration with the NYS Tax Department to continue to receive STAR exemptions in 2014 and subsequent years. If you did not complete this registration, then you must complete the application referred to above and return it to your local assessor by March 1st. You can look on your 2014 tax bill to verify if you are currently receiving the Basic STAR exemption or if you need to re-apply.
- 2) The Enhanced (Senior) STAR exemption is available for the primary residences of senior citizens (age 65 and older) with yearly household incomes not exceeding the statewide standard. For qualifying senior citizens, the Enhanced STAR program works by exempting a portion of the full market value of their home from property taxes (\$64,200 for the 2014-2015 school year). For property owned by a husband and wife, or by siblings, only one of them must be at least 65 years of age as of December 31st of the year in which the exemption will begin to qualify for the Enhanced exemption. Their combined annual income, however, must not exceed the STAR income standard (currently \$83,300).

Seniors must re-apply annually or participate in the Income Verification Program. The assessor's office suggests that senior citizens apply for, or renew, your application when you receive your school tax bill each year. That will ensure that you will continue to receive your Enhanced STAR exemption for the following year.

FORESTVILLE CENTRAL SCHOOL DISTRICT CENSUS

The Forestville CSD updates annually school census information. It is very important that we keep an up-to-date record of all children from birth to age 18 who reside in the district. In addition we need to identify children with disabilities from birth through age 21. It is our responsibility to ensure that all school-age children in our district are receiving approved instruction in a public, private or parochial school or are home taught. The information required on the form below will aid the District in numerous ways, including planning for transportation routes, school attendance areas, and future enrollment projections. Please return the census if you meet any of the following conditions:

- You are a new District resident with young children NOT currently attending school
- You have recently had a baby or adopted a child
- Your children attend school in another district, attend a private school or are home taught.
