# Sorting

This month we will begin to sort just about everything in our classroom. We will sort by color, size, and shape. Part of building strong math skills is developing the ability to sort and organize materials so they can be easily counted, categorized, added, and divided. Sorting promotes children's ability to organize the items in their world so they make sense and are manageable.

Ideas for your home: Allow your children to sort eating utensils (forks & spoons), socks, loose change, recyclables, etc. and we're sure you will definitely enjoy the extra help around the house as well!



Fires kill more Americans every year than floods, hurricanes, tornadoes and earthquakes combined according to the National Fire Incident Reporting System. What can you do to keep your family safe?

- 1. Teach your children never to play with matches, lighters, or any flame producing equipment.
- Familiarize your child with the sound of the smoke detector and instruct them on what to do when it goes off. Practice this monthly and every time your cooking causes it to go off! (If you dismiss it because of cooking, there's a chance your child will dismiss it in the middle of the night thinking you are just cooking.)
- 3. Practice stop, drop, and roll.
- 4. Remind your child not to hide and fire fighters are their friends.
- 5. Have smoke detectors on each floor in your home & one outside every bedroom.
- 6. Change batteries in smoke detectors twice a year.
- 7. Have an escape plan and practice it. Ensure you have a "safe meeting place" outside.
