The first half of the school year has been rather busy and quite successful.

Our first round of our Farm to School grant has ended. Our second round of Farm to School funding is in full swing. We just applied for our third round of funding for Farm to School. Our fingers are crossed and we are hopeful that we will be successful in obtaining more grant funding to keep the positive momentum going. We were awarded six grants through the Northern Chautauqua Community Foundation. We are in the process of working on a new grant to help with our required records retention. Forestville School Adding Text Messaging to our Notification System

Currently, our school utilizes the SchoolMessenger system to deliver voice messages to our parents and staff with important information about events, school closings, safety alerts and more. In the next month we will be adding Text Messages (SMS) capability to this service. This will be an "Opt-In" option for anybody that is currently in our system for receiving voice messages.

During the week of February 10th, the SchoolMessenger system will send out this Opt-In text message asking the user if they wish to receive the text messages. Recipients wanting to participate in this free service can just reply to the text message with "Yes". After this initial request is sent out, parents and staff will be able to join the service just by sending a text message of "Y" or "Yes" to our school's short code number, 67587. In either case, you can opt out of these messages at any time by simply replying to one of our messages with "Stop".

Please be aware that School Messenger does not charge recipients for the text messages that they receive or send to the short code, however, wireless providers may charge you for individual text messages, depending on the plan associated with the wireless device. Please consult your carrier if you are uncertain.

We will use the SchoolMessenger system to send out a voice message to all parents and staff on the day of the roll-out to remind you that the opt-in message is being sent out. We will also be posting this and other information on our school website for you to refer to.

"Fatal Vision" Goggles

Ms. Pettit and Officer Grant teamed up to provide tenth grade Health students with an interactive experience using "Fatal Vision" goggles. The goggles help to simulate the coordination and reaction time that result from the consumption of alcohol. These ability impairments are a common cause of accidents and injuries in those who consume alcohol. Accidents and unintentional injuries are the most common cause of death in teens and young adults. Students were able to partake in standard sobriety tests with Officer Grant, such as walking along a line and touching their fingers together. The students also had some fun activities including tossing foam balls, shooting baskets, and dribbling a basketball through a cone course.





Enrichment Students

The fifth and sixth grade Enrichment students worked in groups to study simple machines, complex machines, velocity, launch angle, range, trajectory, kinetic energy, elastic potential energy, gravitational potential energy, and work. They used this information to design and build launchers and receivers. The overall goal of the project was to see whose launcher could launch the farthest into its receiver. Their designs were clever and unique.



Coat of Arms Project



Students in Mr. Langworthy's ninth grade Global Studies classes recently completed their unit on The Middle Ages with a special one-day project creating their own Coat of Arms. Students were encouraged to create their own design, based on the medieval meanings of colors and symbols. The project was also a chance for students to share a little about themselves and what is most important to them. Designs will be displayed in the hall outside of Mr. Langworthy's classroom until after the holiday break.

Buildings and Grounds Department

Happy New Year from the Buildings and Grounds department. We are excited to announce that Phase I of the 2018 Capital Project is now complete. Phase I included a new bus parking area and a new roof system over the high school gymnasium. Parts of Phase II of the 2018 Capital Project will start as soon as Mid-Winter Recess. New classroom heating units and a generator will be installed at the Elementary School, and the Science lab will be renovated at the High School.Our department was very busy over the summer. Our contractor has completed the Science room renovations for the 2018-2019 Capital Outlay Project. We installed new plumbing for the sinks, an emergency eye wash station and completed the chemical storage room. With the help of the Technology department and Mr. Murphy's integration of Chromebooks, we were able to convert a computer lab into a special education classroom. We also worked with the District and Business Offices in the elementary school to move and reorganize our record retention rooms. We also painted five elementary classrooms and the record retention spaces.

On May 19, 2020, Forestville Central School District residents will have the opportunity to vote on a Capital Improvement Project Proposition that is designed to address the district's needs in the areas of: Building repairs, heating, and safety.

Effects of Drugs and Alchohol

Officer Grant's presentation informed students on the physical and emotional effects, legal penalties and consequences, and national and local statistics regarding the use of drugs and alcohol. Students also had an opportunity to try out impairment goggles that simulate the effects of being under the influence of marijuana and the different levels of blood alcohol consumption. This hands-on activity powerfully demonstrated the realistic dangers of impairment.

Momentum

Students in Regents Physics have been learning about momentum and impulse this week as part of their core curriculum. One of the labs involves measuring their own momentum using large scooters. The students calculate their speed and determine their momentum as they fly down the hallway with the help of a push from a fellow peer. The next lab involves measuring the impulse of stopping their motion. It is meant to display how a varying applied force over an increased time interval relates to the reason why airbags in cars are much safer at stopping passengers than hitting a hard dashboard. The labs are an interactive and fun way to explore the principles of physics.



Military Care Packages

Forestville Central School was a 2019 recipient of six Mini-Grant Projects funded by the Northern Chautauqua Community Foundation. The "Forestville Footlocker Military Care Packages project" was awarded to our Elementary Senior Library Clerk, Mrs. Schneider. This project was designed to teach respect and promote gratitude for our troops. It was also a way for our students to send a little piece of home to our troops to help them stay connected while they are away. A donation letter was made and sent out district wide to help collect items for the care packages, such as toiletries, snacks, entertainment, and other necessities. A list of suggested items was provided by the Blue Star Mothers of America, Inc. Lake Erie New York Chapter 4. A 50-gallon drum sized bin was decorated by a handful of Mrs. San George's art students and was placed in the Elementary School lobby to collect donations. In the time period from October 10th to November 8th, our donation bin had been completely filled and additional items were being placed in bags on the side. Mrs. Schneider, in collaboration with our Elementary students, started on assembling the packages for the December 11, 2019 Christmas shipping deadline. Christmas themed scrap booking decorations were used to put our troops in the holiday spirit. "Thank You" stickers were placed inside the packages, as well as thank you cards and Christmas cards, handmade by the students. A total of twenty packages were decorated, packed, and shipped off to our deployed troops overseas. Civil War Museum Visit

On November 22, Mr. Langworthy and his Civil War students traveled to the Echoes Through Time Civil War Museum in Springville. The class partners with the museum, which is the only existing Civil War Museum in New York State. The students visit the museum to work on displays that are featured in their public tours. The students simultaneously earn valuable experience by volunteering in the museum and earn class credit for their work. Mr. Langworthy has been working with the museum for many years. The museum volunteers frequently come to our school for various activities, including Civil War Camps and classroom visits.



Nick Weith Named New Nutrition Education Integrator

We would like to welcome Nick Weith to our school. Nick is our Shared Nutrition Education Integrator (shared with Pine Valley Schools). His position is funded through the Farm to School grant. We are pleased to have someone with his background join us. Nick has a degree in Culinary Arts along with a Bachelor's degree in Business Studies and a Master's degree in Urban Adolescent and Special Education which he obtained from Canisius College in Buffalo.

He started his teaching career with Buffalo City Schools through the Teach for America program where he served as a Special Education teacher. Since joining us, he has hit the ground running. He has been working closely with our School Superintendent, Mrs. Garrett, on obtaining more grants, Farm to School planning, special state initiative grants, Farm to Institution work, and meeting with Cornell Cooperative Extension members across western New York who are also Farm to School coordinators for several districts. Nick has also been working with our cafeteria staff and has been described as, "a breath of fresh air." He is planning on working side by side with our cooks as they test out new recipes that require cooking from scratch. At the same time, he has been reworking our menus and adding new ideas to all the great things we are already doing. He will also be working with teachers in all grade levels to help educate our students in nutrition and healthy eating habits.



An interesting fact about Nick is that he interned at one of the very first "Pay what you can" restaurants in Denver called the SAME Cafe (So All May Eat), serving healthy gourmet meals to the needy, while at the same time welcoming other patrons who could pay more to help offset the costs. His job was helping to coordinate volunteers and working the many jobs in the restaurant itself. Since then, many more of the "SAME" style restaurants have been popping up across the country whose mission is to create community through healthy food access for all.

We welcome Nick and look forward to seeing all the healthy improvements he can make for our students.



Alumni Update

Our Alumni Spotlight for this edition features James "Jim" Cash, Forestville Central School Class of 1971. Jim grew up on Route 83 in the Town of Arkwright, where he lived with his mother, father, and sister. His mother, Ann, was a homemaker, while his father, Robert, worked at Niagara Mohawk in Dunkirk. His sister, Sally, was also a Forestville student a mere two grades ahead of him. Jim says his elementary school years were challenging, but once in high school he blossomed, due to his strengths in math and science. Not only did Jim excel in the classroom, but he was also involved in other school activities. He was manager of the basketball team under the supervision of coach Tom Herring.





Jim attributes his life-long success to all the great teachers he had, but one certain staff member tops the list. He says principal John Lafferty's positive guidance and interest aided in his matriculation to Syracuse University's School of Engineering, where he joined the ROTC program. Jim was delayed going into the Air Force and had to find a job locally to sustain himself. During this transition is when he met his, now, wife of 42 years, MaryEllen. When he officially joined the Air Force, he was first in a pilot training program in Del Rio, TX, and then later home based out of Bergstrom Air Force Base. After his Air Force career, Jim moved on to pursue an opportunity with the National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) in Washington D.C. His official role became Cockpit Voice Recorder Specialist, where he analyzed



recordings from recovered black boxes. Jim was involved in analyzing recordings from international accidents, train accidents, and airplane accidents from 1983 on, including the traumatic events of September 11, 2001. Jim held this title for 34 years. He switched gears and became a National Resource Specialist, which presented him with more international duties. His last title held before his retirement was Chief Technical Scientist, which focused on the new standards for the black box recorders.

Over the years, Mr. Cash has been the recipient of two prestigious Government awards. In 2007, he received the Presidential Award, and in 2012, he received the Samuel J. Heyman Service to America Medal for career achievement in public service. This in turn lead to reforms and greater safety for the traveling public.

Jim actively serves as a witness for the terrorist trials of September 11, 2001, and he also does consulting work on the side for Engineering Systems, Inc., an engineering and scientific investigation and analysis firm. Jim says his other time is spent participating in activities with Habitats for Humanity, which he has been a member of for 25 years. He and his wife also do some light traveling across the country. He visits Forestville frequently during the year to visit his mother, who still resides in his childhood home. His favorite part about coming home is going to the lakeshore in Dunkirk. He says he enjoys the peaceful sounds, scenery, and fresh air. His advice to upcoming graduates is to seek out an adult who takes interest in their goals and can offer them positive guidance. Jim attributes his own personal success to this mindset.

DASA

The Dignity for All Students Act (DASA) was signed into law on September 13, 2010 and took effect on July 1, 2012. The act prohibits harassment and discrimination of students by peers and by school personnel. In addition, amendments to the regulation have added explicit references prohibiting bullying and cyber bullying. The act covers all public Elementary and secondary aged students and applies to behaviors on school property, in school buildings, on a school bus, as well as school-sponsored events or activities. 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
