

Life Cycle and Weather

The topics of Weather and Life Cycles have been a focus in third grade. The students have been busy making posters on various types of hazardous weather and life cycles of different animals. The children received their own caterpillars to study that life cycle. Over a course of a month, they observed the caterpillar make its transformation into a butterfly. The students were really excited to release these magnificent insects from the school environment into a more natural habitat. Our weather portion of the curriculum concluded with the pupils and their families creating dioramas. We will be winding up the school year with a wonderful trip to the Buffalo Zoo, where the students can witness different animal life cycles and learn about their climates of origin.



Enrichment Program Robotics

The students in the third and fourth grade enrichment program worked with Lego Robotics. This gave them the opportunity to explore different coding programs such as CargoBot and Fix the Factory. They used Lego bricks to make several different robots and coding software to "bring the robots to life." Once the students built and coded the different robots available through the program, they worked in groups to design their own with similar movements. Their designs and final products were quite clever.



Fifth Graders Making Windmills



The students in Miss Raichel's fifth grade experimented with mechanical engineering. They learned about wind turbines, windmills, and the purpose of each. They followed the four step Engineering Design Process to design and construct a windmill that would lift weights. The students were completely engaged throughout this experience and designed amazing windmills.

Sixth Graders Energy Project

The sixth graders recently ended a unit on energy and seeking out alternative energy sources to fossil fuels. It was an interdisciplinary unit combining English and Science. Students learned and researched in Science class about the different energies. All students were required to write a persuasive research report for English while producing a 3 dimensional project or visual to present to the class. As a culminating activity, the students took a trip to Niagara Falls and took a ride on the Maid of the Mist. This experience allowed the students to see first-hand the power of natural resources.

Civil War Museum Visits FCS



This year as a finish to the 7th grade's study of the Civil War in Mr. Langworthy's Social Studies Classes, the Echoes Through Time Museum volunteers visited our school for a "Civil War Day" on Friday June 7th. Presentations were done on the Life of a Soldier, the Confederacy, and Civil War Medicine. The Echoes Through Time Museum in Springville is the only exclusively Civil War Museum in New York State. CLEP College Credits

Forestville High School offers College Level Examination Program (CLEP) courses in Spanish and Chemistry. These classes teach college level material usually covered in the first two years of study at the University level. At the conclusion of the courses, students take the CLEP exams where passing scores grant college credit. This year was another successful year for our students. 

Clubfoot is a birth defect that is characterized by one or both feet being bent under. Mason's treatment has included many full-leg casts, foot braces, and three surgeries. His book is called "In My Feet: Mason's Clubfoot Story." Mason read his book to ten different classrooms and answered the students' questions. He spread a message of perseverance. No matter what type of challenge one faces, they should never give up and try hard to get through difficult challenges, just as he has done when learning to walk - four times so far in his life! His book is for sale through Amazon.com and Barnes and Noble. He is donating all of the proceeds from his sales to organizations that have helped him on his journey, such as Shriner's Hospital. Mason is also selling shoelaces in his "Laces For Braces" campaign, to increase clubfoot awareness and to provide foot braces for children in developing countries who are unable to get their feet fixed without this help. Many staff and students purchased autographed copies of Mason's book and shoelaces, raising over \$200 in profits that will be donated! Thank you Forestville! This home is a quiet sanctuary for rest and relaxation after a day at the hospital, a place where family members can meet and share experiences, concerns, joys and grief.

Our seniors planned and prepared brunch for the families currently staying at the house and hosted a collection drive of items to be donated. The items on the house wishlist help keep the house clean and stocked so that the families can focus all their energy on the health of their loved ones.

The Ronald McDonald House has extended their services into the

John R. Oishei Children's Hospital. They have opened a family lounge on the fifth floor of the hospital that is a welcoming, home-like space for families, just steps away from their children in the hospital. They also use donated items to stock the Happy Wheels Cart. The Cart is designed to surprise families who wait hours at the hospital without leaving their child's bedside. The Cart travels room to room offering patients and families complimentary beverages and snacks as well as activities to help pass the time.

Music Students Visit Atlanta

The Music Department had an incredibly successful trip to Atlanta, GA this past May. The students had great experiences and adventures in a new city, as well as extremely high level performances and educational opportunities.

Thirty-eight students from the high school Concert Band, Jazz Ensemble, Marching Band, Women's Choir and Mixed Choir performed against six other schools from different parts of the country.

Adjudicators evaluated performances and worked with the groups. The Choir groups received many compliments regarding programming, listening, and maturity as ensembles. The Women's Choir and Mixed Choir each received a Gold rating, the highest a group can be scored in this competition. In addition, Adrianna Burgos was selected by the judges to receive a Maestro award. This prestigious award is chosen from all competing choirs and is given to a student who displays an extraordinary level of musicianship. We are so proud of Adrianna for this honor!

Judges also commended the High School Concert Band's challenging program of music, and were delighted that an anvil was used to accurately perform Second Suite in F for Military Band by Gustav Holst, which was written in 1911. They were very impressed with the amount of sound produced by our comparatively small ensemble. The Concert Band received a Silver rating. The Jazz Ensemble was praised for their great performance where our solo sections received our highest scores. It was great to feature these hard working students! The Hornet Marching Band also received a Silver rating. The judges loved the choreography. In addition to the success of our performing ensembles, Madison Miller was recognized individually, as she was chosen for the Ovation Award. This award goes to one student in the entire festival "whose contribution to your music program transcends the making of music and goes beyond your classroom walls." She was selected based on Miss Leone's nomination that described how she gives of herself on behalf of our music program, community, and school.

While in Atlanta, the students also toured several areas: the World of Coca Cola, where they learned how Coca-Cola is made and tasted different kinds of their soft drinks from around the world; Centennial Olympic Park, where the 1996 Summer Olympics were held; rode on the 200-foot SkyView Atlanta ferris wheel; and experienced the Georgia Aquarium, which is the second largest aquarium in the world and features tens of thousands of different animals. They even watched a dolphin show before the awards ceremony, which was held in the same theatre.

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
