Mr. John "Jack" Szydlo Retires

Mr. Szydlo began his career at Forestville Central School as a substitute English teacher in June of 1969. He was originally hired as a 7th and 8th grade history teacher as well as a JV football coach.

In 1970, he was drafted in the US Army. The Army allowed him to finish out that school year before sending him to boot camp in July. After completing his basic training, he was sent to Fort Gordon, Georgia for 10 weeks of military police training. He was then sent to work in an American prison in Mannheim, Germany as a Correctional Specialist instead of Vietnam. After a year in Germany, Jack returned to the US

and began his new assignment at West Point, NY. He served as a company clerk in charge of preparing reports, updating unit files and handling correspondence. The Secretary of the Army awarded Specialist 5, John P. Szydlo, "The Army Commendation Medal" for his outstanding professional competence and devotion to duty.

Jack returned to Forestville in 1972 to teach 8th, 10th, & 12th grade history, as well as coach jv baseball, varsity basketball, and football. In 1980, he became the high school principal. After serving 10 years in that position, Jack went "down to the little school" to begin his 17 year stint as a 5th Grade teacher. Jack has also served on the Elementary and High School Building Teams, the Regents Action Plan, and School Improvement Plan committees.

Additionally, Jack has been a Driver Education instructor in Forestville, Dunkirk, and Fredonia since 1976. He has also taught 5-hour driver education courses and officiated many basketball, football, track, and volleyball games over the past 30 years.

Jack has many interests and hobbies. He loves to travel, garden, play sports, and work on the family farm. He enjoys meeting new people and visiting Civil War battlefields. He likes going to air shows, the Daytona 500, and is also a member of the Geneseo Warplane Museum in Geneseo, NY.


Building for the Future

A check in the amount of \$2530.00 was recently presented to the Western New York Affiliate of the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Research Foundation. Forestville faculty and students helped to organize the annual event, bringing the combined amount to over \$6000 in the past four years.

Through the generosity of various local businesses and the SUNY Fredonia Office of Campus Life, the 4th annual charity dress sale was held March 29, 2008 in the Williams Center on the campus of Fredonia State College. Area students and parents from all ends of Chautauqua County including: Dunkirk, Fredonia, Cassadaga, Pine Valley, Brocton, Forestville, and Ripley were among those in attendance at the sale, with proceeds benefiting the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation. Over the past year Forestville faculty members Amanda Oddo-Tonelli and Brianne Hazelton worked to coordinate the event. The preliminary stages began with the collection of new and gently used dresses from all areas of Western New York. Several Buffalo-area bridal salons: Christine's of Cheektowaga along with Bridals by "D" and the Bridal Chateau both of Williamsville donated nearly 250 brand new dresses for the sale. In addition, residents from all over Chautauqua County contributed dresses adorned the sales racks the morning of the sale. The dress sale served a dual purpose; dresses were sold to students for \$25.00, a price vastly cheaper than department stores; also being a charity event, proceeds were collected and donated to the foundation.

While at the dress sale, shoppers previewed the most current trends in formalwear during a fashion show featuring student models from many local schools in the county. A number of area businesses offered their services to ensure the event's success. Petri's of Silver Creek graciously donated cookies that served as refreshments for shoppers. Each customer that purchased a dress was also given a 50% off coupon to have their dresses cleaned and pressed at Jim's Dry Cleaners of Fredonia. Wal-Mart also donated \$1,000 to the dress sale.

Spanish V Earns College Credit

Recently, the Spanish V class went to JCC to take the Spanish College Level Examination Program (CLEP) test. This is a computer based examination that is created to measure the students' Spanish language proficiency. Each student's scores are converted to a scaled score that ranges from 20, the lowest, to 80, the highest. The exam awards 6 college credits to those that score a 50 or higher and 12 college credits to those that score a 66 or higher.

Holocaust Course - 1 semester

This course will consider the reality and implications of the Nazi campaign to destroy European Jews from 1933 to 1945. With technological advantages of interactive microphones and cameras, the teacher will encourage discussion among class members in the three participating schools, and will invite survivors of the Holocaust to sharpen students' focus and sensitivity. Limited to six appropriately motivated and self-reliant students in each school, the course will require some outside reading and a major project, along with occasional tests and a running journal of the course experience.

JCC Criminal Justice - Fall; college credit (Human Services – Spring)

An interdisciplinary survey of the American criminal justice system with specific topical emphasis on crime, law enforcement, courts, and corrections. Students must learn and discuss cogently the significance of legal and behavioral aspects of crime, the process of justice, various law enforcement entities within the United States, the need for various court structures, and various penological systems.

Sports Management 1 & 2 - Full Year

The world of sports management is a big business full of huge budget decisions and complex negotiations. Learning what sports fans and athletes want and need and promoting sporting organizations both large and small are key management activities. Students will look at sports as a business and as entertainment, as well as from various perspectives, such as agent, fan, athlete, and more. You'll study the history of sports management and analyze past sporting events, looking closely at the management decisions that were made. You'll also critique advertising and other promotional methods, and learn about sports licensing.

Psychology - 1 Year

Psychology may be defined as the scientific study of mental processes and the behavior of organisms. Major objectives of the course are not merely the acquisition of knowledge. It is hoped that a better understanding of oneself will be realized. A thorough investigation of the basic viewpoints of psychology (Psychoanalytic, Behaviorist, Cognitive, and Humanist) comprises much of the course. Other topics include research methods, learning and cognitive processes, the workings of the mind and body (sensation and perception, altered states of consciousness, etc.), personality, psychological testing, and abnormal psychology.

Fashion & Design (Art) - 1 Year

Fashion Illustration is an advanced course to be elected after a student has completed a full year in Studio in Art and preferably, Drawing & Painting. It is designed to develop in students the knowledge and understanding of the aesthetics principles and skills involved in fashion illustration. This course covers fashion history, the development of fashion illustration, its function of enhancing the figure, the processes in preparing fashion illustrations. Experiences similar to those found in fashion and fashion advertising studios should be simulated in the classroom, including the use of live-models during part of the year.

Business Law - 1 Year

Applications of the business laws, as they affect the individual, are featured; the relationship of the law to an individual's personal, as well as occupational life, is emphasized.

Computer Graphics with MAYA - 1 Year

This course teaches an introduction to 3D modeling, including the use of color, textures, materials, lighting, shading, rendering, animation, using the Academy Award winning software program MAYA. MAYA has been used to create the computer graphics characters, objects, and animations, as seen in the hit movies Shrek, Monsters Inc. and Final Fantasy. Students will be using the free down-loadable PLE edition which will allow objects and scenes to be saved and viewed. The PLE edition is freely available for both the MacIntosh and PC Windows platforms at www.alias.com

In the MacGyver competition, each team was given materials to make a vehicle which traveled by air, water or land. Cassidy, Chad and Anthony made an air propelled boat for their competition vehicle. Their vehicle went the farthest distance and won the competition. Maggie Brennan and Aubrey Gawron with three Sherman Central students won first place in the "Fit Club" competition. In this competition, the girls measured heart rate, blood



pressure and breathing rate during different activities. Aubrey and Maggie analyzed the data they collected and graphed it. They took the graphs and wrote a report that analyzed the results. There were approximately 100 students in each of their competitions. About 500 students from area schools competed in the events during the day. 




