Building Project

The 2009-2010 school year is proving to be a very busy time for all. I am happy to report that we continue to make progress on the building project and some of the new and renovated spaces are already in use. The new bus garage is now open. The bus maintenance staff can address the maintenance issues much more efficiently and the buses are no longer backing up into the student entrance to the high school, a much safer solution. The cafeteria and kitchen are also open for business. The new arrangement allows us to offer students a wider array of meal choices while reducing the number of lunch periods in the school day. In addition to the cafeteria, the following rooms have been renovated and are also open for student use: special education, choral, distance learning, health office and art. The new main office is also open and is now located on the first floor. Having the offices located in the front corner of the building creates a much more "user-friendly" and safer environment. I would like to thank all our students, parents and staff for their patience while the existing building was under renovation. Progress is also being made on the new auditorium and band room and we are hoping to have access by early spring. The District is also planning an open house where the public will be invited to tour the new and renovated facilities.

H1N1

As the occurrences of flu-like illness become more prevalent, the Forestville Central School District continues to take steps to monitor the conditions in our school and our community to ensure the safety and health of our staff and students. The District administration and the school nurses continue to monitor early dismissal and absenteeism of staff and students.

We continue to stress important measures that we are taking to prevent the spread of the flu at school:

- Encouraging frequent hand washing
- Providing for extra disinfection procedures during the day and after school
- Making hand sanitizer available for times when hand washing is impractical
- Establishing Health Office procedures to isolate students with flu-like symptoms while waiting to go home

To limit chances of getting or spreading the flu, it is helpful to encourage your family to follow these recommendations:

- Wash your hands often with soap and warm water or use a hand sanitizer.
- Avoid people who are ill and stay home if you are sick.
- Use a tissue when you cough, sneeze or spit, or cough and sneeze into your elbow upper sleeve.
- Dispose of the tissues in a no-touch trash can.
- Keep hands away from your face. Avoid touching your eyes, nose or mouth.
- Clean shared space such as phone receivers, keyboards, steering wheels and office equipment, more often.

The School District in conjunction with the Health Department offered the H1N1 influenza vaccine to our students and school community on Wednesday, January 20th at the Forestville Elementary School gymnasium. If you have any general questions about the seasonal or H1N1 influenza viruses or vaccines, you may call 2-1-1 at any time.

For more specific questions about the vaccine or vaccination clinics, please call the Health Department at 1-866-604-6789 from 9:00 am to 5:00 pm Monday through Friday. Your child's health care provider also can answer your questions about the 2009 H1N1 influenza virus and may be able to give your child the seasonal and H1N1 influenza vaccine. You can also contact your child's school nurse for any questions on the clinic or vaccine. Five-Year Budget Plan

The Forestville Central School District continues to place a priority on delivering a quality education while remaining fiscally responsible to the taxpayers. In an effort to become more financially efficient, the Board of Education is in the process of developing a long-term budget plan. The purpose of the plan is to review district expenses and revenues over five years. This allows us to make informed budgetary decisions based on long-term information. With a gloomy outlook for state aid in the future it becomes increasingly important to make educated budgetary decisions for our school community.

The District is also investigating entering into an energy performance contract. This contract potentially allows us to install new and more efficient equipment that will lower our energy use and reduce greenhouse gas emissions. The facility and capital improvements made are funded through the energy savings and are of no cost to the District. In other schools, items such as lighting and boilers have been replaced with more efficient equipment. Companies are currently in the process of submitting proposals to the district. The Board of Education will review proposals and hopefully we will receive a bid that will allow us to upgrade some of our equipment.

Gym Floor – Boilers



Due to the August flooding, our gym floor and boiler room at the elementary school were damaged. The boilers required extensive repairs and cleaning. Fortunately, we were able to get all repair work completed prior to the winter heating season. The elementary gym floor was damaged beyond repair and was replaced in November. The new gym floor is fully installed and was re-opened the first week of December. The District is working with our insurance company, FEMA and the State Education Department to cover the expense of this emergency project.

From the Desk of Mr. Grande

It's hard to imagine that the school year is half way through. Things are moving along at a rapid pace! Now is a good time for parents to ask this question... "Am I involved enough in my child's education?" I assume the response for some of you will be a resounding "Yes!" While others may not definitively know this answer to this important question. If you need some guidance on this topic, read on.

Here are some tips to help you:

Encourage your child to do his best in school. Talk to him about how important it is for him to get a good education. Provide examples of role models who have valued their education and try to get him to see the connection between a solid education and success in life.

Place an emphasis on education. It is important for your child to be involved in nonacademic activities after school such as dance, theater, sports, recreational play, hobbies, etc. However, the strongest emphasis should be on your child's education. Parents can help their child organize these activities to ensure a focus on academics.

When speaking of role models for children, the first and foremost role model for any child has to be the parent. It's okay for children to have positive role models outside of the home, but the most important role model is a parent. With this in mind, it is critical that you demonstrate your support with your child's school. In doing so, parents can read with their child, assist during homework time, help them organize their folders and book bags, offer assistance in the classroom, get involved in the Parent Connection, attend scheduled conferences, keep the lines of communication open with the teacher, etc. It's a lot of work but so worth the effort!

Support the school rules and any consequences that may result if a rule is broken. Stress the importance of trying his best to follow the rules so that everyone stays safe and that everyone has an opportunity to learn without distractions.

Lastly, provide educational resources at home for your child. Have lots of reading and basic math materials on hand, bookmark safe Internet sites, provide educationally based computer games, etc. With Internet access, parents don't have to spend lots of money buying computer games! There are many websites with educational activities/games that are free of charge for children.

Annual Make A Difference Day Held

Students, faculty, and community members of Forestville Central School concluded their 18th year of participation in the national Make-a-Difference Day project with a celebration.

An assembly was held on December 18th in the Elementary School gymnasium. A PowerPoint of photographs, created by Mike Murphy, district technology coordinator, highlighted the numerous activities held during the month of October. Mrs. Carol McPeak-McDonald announced the grand total of **\$7,204.70** raised in a six week time period! This amount is highest ever collected by the school. With the 2009 funds, FCS has raised and donated a total of **\$42,290.47** - all of which has benefited local and regional charities and individuals.



For 2009, a \$2,000 check was presented to Ms. Robin Hace, a representative from **Roswell Park Cancer Institute/ Carly's Club**, to purchase TVs and TV stands for the pediatric unit. The young patients will be able to connect video game systems to these TVs and be able to play them in their own rooms during their recovery.

Another \$2,000 check was presented to the Rev. & Mrs. Ellis to help with the **Neighbor-to-Neighbor Community Center & Food Pantry**.

A third check in the amount of \$3,000 was presented to a Forestville teacher whose son has been facing medical challenges this past year.



“We are truly touched by your overwhelming generosity,” McPeak-McDonald stated during the presentation. “Our hope at Forestville Central School is that these students who volunteer at an early age will learn important life skills and will continue to volunteer into adulthood... becoming responsible and caring citizens.”

In June, all students who participated will receive a certificate of appreciation for all their hard work at an awards assembly.

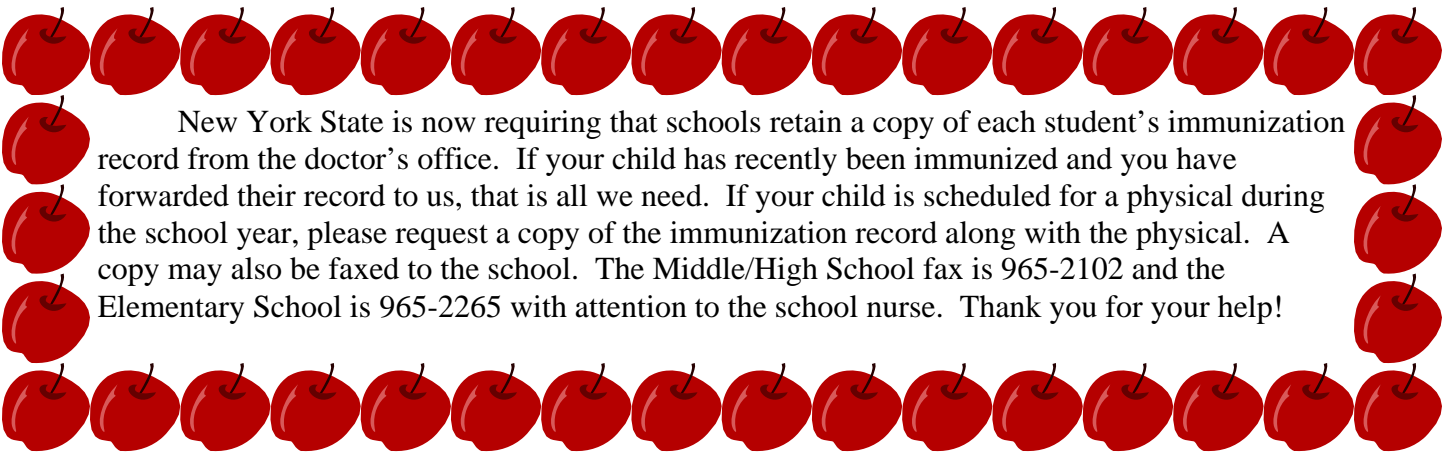

“Back to School Parent Workshop”

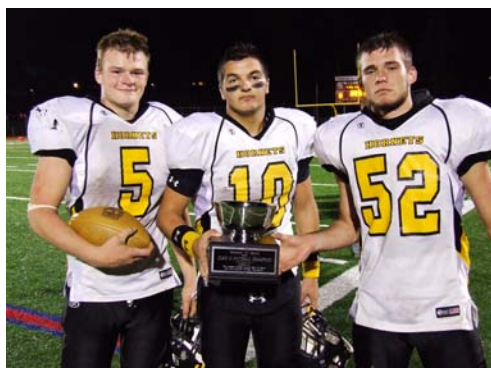

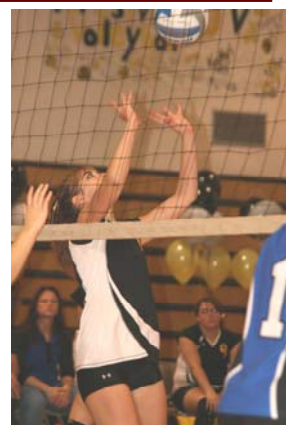

FREE TAX PREPARATION IS COMING TO FORESTVILLE HIGH SCHOOL

The Volunteer Income Tax Assistance Program (VITA) will help low to moderate income (generally, \$49,000 and below) eligible people file their tax returns electronically and claim the Earned Income Tax Credit.
