Forestville Construction Project to Begin

I am excited to inform the Forestville school community that construction on the building project will commence over the Christmas break. Administration met last week with our architects and representatives of the construction firms to coordinate the various roles and responsibilities that will need to be completed during the construction process. The District has also hired Tom Bixby, a Forestville resident, from the architecture firm Harrington Sandberg to oversee the day-to-day project activities.

The main components of the project include a new multi-purpose auditorium, new band room, relocation of the main offices to the first floor front of the building, new bus garage located in the rear of the existing high school parking lot, movement of the football field to the back of the elementary school, renovation of the high school cafeteria and a new wastewater treatment facility.

Due to the amount of work at the middle/high school, some of our classrooms will be unavailable during the construction process. A plan was developed by Mr. Leichner and the counseling department to assure that all classes would continue as originally planned. This requires teachers to share classrooms and for students to take classes in different rooms than they were originally scheduled. The new plan will be implemented when we return from Christmas break. All students and staff members will receive a revised schedule denoting any room changes. We expect minimal disruptions to students and staff at the elementary school.

Although I am sure that we will face some unexpected challenges over the next eighteen months, I am confident that the faculty, staff and students will rise to the occasion. We are all looking forward to the upgrade in facilities and what it will mean for improving the academic programs for the Forestville school community.

Forestville Welcomes a New Staff Member Officer Rob Lazarczyk

We are excited to announce a great new opportunity for our student population. In cooperation with Silver Creek Central School District we are welcoming a member of the Silver Creek Police Department to serve as a part time School Resource Officer for our school! The School Resource Officer (SRO) will assume rotating roles as teacher, counselor and law enforcement officer. The officer is not a school disciplinarian, but will work in cooperation with the school administration to enhance the learning environment by building rapport with students and the community. The SRO uses all resources available to help students, the school and the community to find a solution to whatever challenges they may encounter.

When acting as counselor, the SRO is available to talk to students, parents, teachers, and the administration about problems that may involve the criminal justice system. School Resource Officers bring additional resources into the school to which others may not have access. Because of their experience, training and their assignment, our SRO will have time to talk with students when they may need to talk to someone, and will have an opportunity to become a positive influence in their lives. A resource officer will help young people and their families with situations that could become dangerous if not diverted by referral to the resources available in the community. It is the responsibility of the SRO to know what resources are available and help to make the appropriate referrals.

In the classroom, an SRO will bring their experience and a sense of real world to their students. SROs' presentations are designed to be integrated into the school curricula and supplement the subject matter in those academic areas. The SRO is trained to speak about search and seizure in government classes, drugs/alcohol and conflict resolution in health classes, crash reconstruction in math classes, child abuse and domestic violence in home economics classes, and about report writing in English classes as well as a host of other topics. Their activities and potential positive impact can be as broad as the imagination of the school staff and the officer involved.

As the law enforcement influence on the campus, the SRO program allows the community to be more involved in their school. The school's job continues to be the education of their students. While the SRO, as the law enforcement presence, will assist school authorities in policing activities and interventions.

When schools and the community work together in an effort like this, young people feel more comfortable and are more likely to learn. The School Resource Officer can make a difference between merely "being" at school and "learning" at school. The School Resource Officer Program is reflective of our investment in proactive community involvement.

Officer Lazarczyk will be in Forestville two days a week, but will be available on an on-call basis whenever school is in session. We are excited to welcome him to our team! From the Desk of Mr. Grande

It's amazing that half the school year is behind us. In no time, winter will be a thing of the past and we'll be cutting grass once again. However, before that snow melts away for good a lot will take place here at the elementary school.

Our testing program will be in full swing in January with the grades 3 - 5 New York State English Language Arts (ELA) assessments. Students will have an opportunity to demonstrate their ability to read, write and edit passages. In the past few years, our test scores have been on the rise and we anticipate that trend to continue. Teachers begin to teach the skills necessary to do well on these tests as early as Kindergarten!

In March, these same students will participate in the State Math assessments. Much like the ELA assessments, our test scores are on the rise! Today's math is much different than when I was a child. Basic computational skills were highly stressed back in the day, but now students have to incorporate much higher levels of reasoning and computation. In addition to the basic math on these assessments, students are required to read text and interpret graphs and charts! We have great confidence in our teaching staff and the abilities of our students. We know they will try their best and do very well.

Please remember that students will need lots of extra rest and encouragement to do their best during these testing weeks. As in the past, the school will offer students who participate in these assessments a nutritional breakfast, free of charge, on testing dates.

As we look ahead to the next school year, it is helpful to have an idea of the number of students who might enroll in our school for Pre-K and Kindergarten. We need to begin to think of staffing needs and potential resources needed in these programs. Financial Aid Night

Forestville Central School will be hosting a financial aid night for seniors and their parents on Wednesday, January 7th. There will be a guest presenter from the financial aid office of Fredonia State College to discuss the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The presentation will be held in the high school library at 7 p.m.

The FAFSA form should be filled out sometime after January 1st. Their website is www.fafsa.ed.gov. This form determines your child's federal and state grants, work-study and loan eligibility. Many colleges and scholarship programs use this form to determine financial eligibility as well. This is an important meeting for any senior that has college in his/her future. Please bring any financial aid questions that you may have!

If you would like to learn about the financial aid process before the financial aid night, please visit <http://www.fafsa4caster.ed.gov/>. FAFSA4caster will help you get an early start on the financial aid process by providing you with an early estimate of your eligibility for federal student aid. In addition, FAFSA4caster will increase your knowledge of the financial aid process and provide information about other sources of aid. If you use FAFSA4caster, when you're ready to officially apply for aid, FAFSA4caster will transfer all of your data to the *FAFSA on the Web* application, making the experience of applying for federal student aid a lot easier for you. Science Department News



Students in Mrs. Miller's Living Environment classes recently celebrated the smallest living unit of life, the cell. Each student designed and created an ornament which depicted a type of eukaryotic cell (eukaryotic cells contain many distinct cell parts, unlike prokaryotic cells). Students made ornaments of plant and animal cells containing nuclei, mitochondria, endoplasmic reticulum, and ribosomes. Plant cells were decorated with glittering green chloroplasts and large vacuoles. Some students went above and beyond the basic eukaryotic cell assignment, creating ornaments of specific cells, such as nerve cells with branching axons, paramecium with cilia surrounding the cell, and euglena which possess flagella, chloroplasts, and a red eye-spot. All students did an excellent job. Decorating room 39, these beautiful ornaments give the class a festive holiday look.



8th Graders Rewarded







Hornet Volleyball Spikes Competition

The Forestville Lady Hornets volleyball team entered the 2008 season with hopes and dreams of a championship on their minds. After a strong showing at team camp in Clarion University, the lady Hornets hit the ground running to start their season. The girls participated in the Fredonia Lady Hillbilly Labor Day Invitational and took home their first ever tournament title. They then continued to follow that tournament by blitzing through opponents in the newly formed Division III East and taking revenge on teams in Division III West. When the smoke cleared, the Lady Hornets finished with a 10-0 league mark, a 6-0



cross-divisional mark and an overall league record of 16-0. They finished the season with an overall record of 19-2 and strong showings in the Panama and Chautauqua Lake tournaments. The Lady Hornets earned the # 1 seed and home court advantage in the Class D play-offs. The Lady Hornets swept Cattaraugus-Little Valley in straight sets in the quarter-final match. Unfortunately, their season came to an end at the hands of eventual sectional champ, Portville, in the semi-finals. The Lady Hornets finished their season with a 20-3 record, the second 20 win season in school history. The "Super Seven" were led by seniors Richelle Sobilo, Chelsea Mead, Erin Gilman, Maddy Kingsfield, and Rhia Johnson, and juniors Alicia Valentine and Kerrin Murphy. This is the second Division III championship in three years for the Hornets with both seasons finishing with undefeated league records.



The Lady Hornets received many awards throughout the season. Alicia Valentine was named MVP of the Fredonia Tournament and was an all-tourney selection at Chautauqua Lake. Richelle Sobilo was named to the all-tourney team at Fredonia, Panama, and Chautauqua Lake. Alicia Valentine was named WDOE Athlete of the Week four times, Post Journal Player of the Week once and Observer Player of the Week once. Richelle Sobilo was named WDOE Player of the Week twice. Chelsea Mead was named WDOE Player of the Week once. Richelle Sobilo was named MVP of Division III East and was a Second Team All-Western New York selection. Alicia Valentine was named to the First Team Division III East and was an Honorable Mention All-Western New York All-Star. Chelsea Mead was a Second team Div. III All-Star. Erin Gilman and Maddy Kingsfield were named Honorable Mention All-Stars in Division III. Chelsea Mead and Erin Gilman were Honorable Mention selections as All-Western New York Scholar Athletes. Not only was it a memorable season from a team standpoint, but our athletes received many well deserved recognitions for all of their hard work throughout the season and their careers as Hornet volleyball players.

Hornet Football Takes D Bowl Title



On Saturday, November 8th, the Hornets traveled to Jamestown's Strider Field for the D Bowl finals against division foe Brocton. The Hornets made two of their three extra points while the Bulldogs missed an extra point which gave Forestville a 20-18 victory. "Extra points are huge," Greenough said. "I tell the kids all the time, extra points can win the game or lose the game for you, and today it won it." The Hornets (8-2) posted their eighth win of the season with the two point victory. "It's big. It's really big. We've been out here before but we haven't won it," Greenough said of the D Bowl championship. "This is the first one we've won and it's really good."

Junior quarterback, Matt Thompson and senior running back Nate Newton led the way for the Hornets. Thompson completed 7 of 12 passes for 144 yards and Newton rushed for 121 yards on 22 carries. Senior, Jason Stockmeyer caught four passes for 94 yards. Newton scored a pair of short touchdown runs in the first half, sandwiched by a Bulldog touchdown. Thompson scored on a 4-yard run on Forestville's opening possession of the second half to give the Hornets a 20-6 lead. The Hornets were 2-7 in 2006 and 5-5 last year. "I think we've only had eight wins in a season once or twice in school history," Greenough said. "It was a great season. This was a great way to cap it off."

Several Hornets were honored in the post season by being named to the Class D; Division III All-star team. They are as follows; 1st team - Ben Gibson, Nate Newton, Jason Stockmeyer, Matt Thompson, Zach Badgley, and Jake Sternisha. 2nd team - Corey Bell, Will Walawender, and Larry Sheldon. Honorable Mention - Nick Stott and Niko Messina.
