On Wednesday, October 25, 2018, the Elementary School gym was full of excitement as 16 students and 2 adults went Bald for Bucks/Beard for Bucks and 5 students, one mother and one teacher donated their hair to Locks of Love. This was the Elementary School's ninth year raising money for Bald for Bucks and the twelfth year adults and students cut their hair to donate it to Locks of Love. The event was a huge success this year!! Teachers, students, family, and community members came together to raise over \$6,000 for cancer research.

The top money raiser this year was Olivia Borrello, she raised \$895! This is Olivia Borrello's first year in our school and first year donating her hair to Locks of Love. Olivia wanted to do this for her Aunt Martha. The second top money raiser was Evan Greenough with \$700. This is also Evan's first year at our school and his first year going Bald for Bucks. He made it a family affair by bringing his mother, Michelle Greenough, who graciously donated 10 inches of her beautiful hair. He got to shave his father's (Mr. Greenough) beard off and then went for his hair. There was a tie for the third top money raiser. Sienna Galofaro and Caleb Kimmerly both raised around \$600. This was Sienna's first time donating her hair to Locks of Love. Caleb on the other hand is our most consistent Bald for Bucks participant! Three students who wanted to help out, but weren't ready to cut their hair teamed together and they raised \$275 on their own. They were fifth graders: Jack Spengler, Evelyn Yeager and Anna Gilman.

Welcome back to a new year! We are off to a wonderful start. There have been so many events and opportunities for our students to participate in. Our school does a tremendous job giving students choices to succeed in their own way. We have are continually building in new and different courses into our overall schedule at the high school. This year, we have added programming by CASAC at all grade levels which provides grade appropriate information for students related to making good choices. We are also incorporating new Wellness ideas and activities as offerings throughout the district. Our Farm-to-School program is just starting to make strides. We are happy to build on the great relationships with our local farmers. Our MS/HS students will see a new offering during the month of November; smoothies will be a part of our breakfast menu.

#### Forestville Farm-to-School Grant

Forestville Central School District and Forestville farmers are extending their relationship through the New York State Department of Agriculture & Markets' Farm-to-School Grant. The grant is beneficial to the school, farmers, and the Forestville community. Money from the grant expands the fresh produce and products for student meals, and opens new markets for the farmers to profit from their products.

The fall season has been optimal for our partnership with Bill Meadows, owner of Meadows Farms. Every week this fall, Forestville has purchased 4 to 6 bushels of apples for our students. The cider refreshments for our open houses were from Meadows as well. Meadows Farms, situated at 10459 Prospect Road in Forestville, is a popular spot in the fall for those who want to enjoy the fall weather and pick their own apples. However, the farm also has a variety of pre-picked apples for those in a hurry, fresh apple cider, pumpkins, mums, fall vegetables, and much more! With daily hours 9:00 a.m. – 6:00 p.m., rain or shine, there is plenty of time to get your fall fix in!

Aside from enhancing the relationships between Forestville and our local farms, the Farm-to-School grant helped kitchens in our Elementary and High Schools purchase new equipment to help process, preserve, and package farm fresh foods. The cafeteria staff will now have the ability to purchase larger amounts of food from local farmers during the harvest season, and preserve it. New vacuum sealing materials and freezers, purchased through the grant, allow these foods to be saved for times of the year when fresh vegetables and fruits are harder, and more expensive, to come by. One of the most exciting ventures is purchasing blenders through the grant. The blenders will allow us to use fresh fruits or vegetables and make smoothies to serve during breakfast or lunch!

With fresh farm products for students and new markets for our local farmers the Farm-to-School grant is a great opportunity for the entire Forestville Community. The state funded grant will continue to support the initiative through 2019, but, the school and local farmers are working to establish relationships that will carry on beyond the grants expiration.

#### **Adrianna Burgos Top Vocalist**

Adrianna Burgos, who auditioned May 2, 2018, was chosen to receive one of several scholarships from the Chautauqua County Music Teachers Association (CCMTA). The awards are given to the highest scoring vocal and instrumental students in three age categories. In addition, she received, the coveted Ed Turner Scholarship with the highest score of the competition.

The top vocal and instrumental winners were invited to perform their winning pieces for the county's music teachers and administrators at the CCMTA's yearly banquet. The banquet was held at Webb's Captain's Table in Mayville, New York on October 10, 2018. Adrianna impressed the crowd with her very beautiful and animated performance of 'Poor Wandering One,' from the comic operetta Pirates of Penzance. We were very happy that Adrianna's parents, Jose and Judith Burgos, accepted the committee's invitation to also join us for the evening.



#### **Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF**

#### **Students Visit Old Fort Niagara**

The seventh grade students visited Old Fort Niagara on October 12th for the annual Fall Frontier Days, an interactive educational program for fourth and seventh grades. Students encountered four great nations that played prominent roles in the Niagara region's history: the Haudenosaunee, France, Great Britain and the United States.

The program for the day focused on the years 1726 - 1815, allowing students to compare and contrast living conditions for Native Americans, French, British and American soldiers who garrisoned the Fort over almost 100 years. Students learned about Native American history and culture, life at an 18th century fort, 18th century foodways, artisans, military music, architecture, engineering and commerce.

The trip was funded by a grant from the New York State Parks Department called "Kids Connect", a competitive grant that teachers may apply for when visiting one of the New York State Parks programs. This is the second year our school applied for and received funding from the grant to allow our students the opportunity to visit Old Fort Niagara! Social Studies teacher, Mr. Langworthy, coordinates the trip each year, with help from Special Education Teacher, Ms. Kubera, Our parent chaperones were Mrs. Stewart and Mrs. Grupa. This year's trip was a fun and educational experience at a truly unique location in our area!

#### **Malt Ball Box Project**

The students in Mr. Dempsey's Principles of Engineering class recently took on the challenge to design a container to hold the highest capacity of Whoppers.

The specifications used for the project were:

- One 8.5 by 11 piece of paper to make the container.
- Draw a scaled design of the container to be constructed.
- Calculate the volume of the designed box.
- The container must be fully enclosed.
- Test the box to see how many malt balls (Whoppers) it will hold. Zach Roland, Macadam Gadewoltz, Zach Barlette-Dye and Nathaniel Bock chose different designs for their containers to maximize the volume. Macadam with a trapezoidal prism and Nate with a cylinder shaped container held the most whoppers. The best part was the students got to eat the Whoppers!

We are off to an incredible start to the 2018-2019 school year! It has been amazing to see how hard our students are working each and every day. The great start to the school year would not be possible without the dedication and commitment of our faculty and staff. Report cards will be distributed during conferences and will not be sent home with your child.

New this year, we are asking parents who are picking up their child from school, to please wait to enter the building until the buses have pulled out of the parking lot. Dismissal can be a hectic time and there is not a location for parents to wait for their children. Parent pick-up is scheduled for 2:45. Students will not be released before this time without prior notice. Our entire staff would like to thank you in advance for your cooperation.

#### DASA

The Dignity for All Students Act (DASA) was signed into law on September 13, 2010 and took effect on July 1, 2012. The Act prohibits harassment and discrimination of students by peers and by school personnel. In addition, amendments to the regulation have added explicit references prohibiting bullying and cyber buying. The Act covers all public elementary and secondary aged students and applies to behaviors on school property, in school buildings, on a school bus, as well as school-sponsored events or activities. #### **Visit to Randolph Hatchery Trip**

The Fish & Wildlife class visited the Department of Environmental Conservation's Randolph Fish Hatchery during a field trip on September 25, 2018. Students were given a tour of hatchery operations and received a detailed explanation of raising trout from eggs to adults. Due to turbid water conditions in the hatchery raceways, caused by heavy rainfall the night before, students were unable to observe the process of stripping eggs (roe) and milt from adult brood stock. However, students were able to observe the hatchery's ponds containing brood stock of the Northern Sunfish, an endangered species in New York State, and learn about the hatchery's role in restoring this species to New York waters. Students asked many questions during their visit and were required to complete a Field Trip report when they returned to the classroom.









#### **Summer Reading Program 2018**



Forestville Elementary School's Reading Teachers, Mrs. Jennifer Dunn and Mr. Gary Worosz, along with Elementary Principal, Mrs. Lindsay Marcinelli, (not shown), challenged all students to tparticipate in the Summer Reading Adventure 2018 – Reading Takes You Everywhere! from June 25th – August 31st.

Students were encouraged to read from 6 of 14 different genres, such as: non-fiction, how-to, mystery, comics, cookbooks, etc. They also had to read in 10 of 16 different "ways," such as: -to a pet; -to a grandparent; -when it rained, -in a tent, -to a sibling, -in a silly voice, etc. Book titles and dates, as well as the parent/guardian's signature was required on the reading checklist.

On Monday, September 10th, all students who successfully completed this Summer Challenge were presented with a reading achievement medal of honor and an award certificate. A total of 33 medals and awards were distributed.

#### Citizen Science and the FCS Science Club

Members of the FCS Science Club have spent the last weeks of summer and first weeks of autumn participating in the Citizen Science Project Monarch Watch through the University of Kansas. Students have learned about insect life cycles by raising Monarch butterfly caterpillars to tag and release. Members of the Science club have also gone afield to capture and tag migrating wild butterflies, collected and recorded data, and have participated in a study that monitors Monarch butterfly populations across the continent. Students have learned how the effects of habitat destruction, the introduction of GMO (Genetically Modified Organisms) crops, and the use of pesticides can affect native populations of insects across the country.

Students came away from this experience with a better appreciation of nature and the outdoors, a realization that they can contribute meaningful information to scientific studies, and that what we do as humans can affect the environment and the organisms that we share it with.









#### **Earth Science Day Field Trip**












Members of the Forestville Science Club visited the Penn – Dixie Site on Oct. 6, 2018 for Earth Science Day. Participating students collected Devonian age (350 – 370 million year old) fossils, observed a rock core drilling demonstration, and observed sunspots and solar flares through telescopes with filtered lenses. They also participated in interactive displays by 18 different colleges, organizations, and businesses illustrating careers in fields of Earth Science, Meteorology, and Environmental Science. Students will create a personal fossil collection by cleaning, identifying, and preserving their fossils during after school meetings.


