The Annual Budget Vote and School Board Election will be on Tuesday, May 20, 2025, from 1-8pm in the Hornet Lobby at the High School.

### Budget Overview

- Our primary focus revolves around elevating student achievement, enhancing our facilities, and broadening our educational programs.
- We prioritize the prudent utilization of reserve funds while upholding the long-term financial stability of the district.
- It is our commitment to deliver top-tier education to our students while upholding fiscal responsibility within our community.
- We aim to foster partnerships with neighboring districts and BOCES to facilitate educational collaborations and shared services.
- Addressing the escalating need for building improvements, we have allocated \$100,000 in the 2025-26 budget for a capital outlay project. We anticipate recouping approximately 86% of these costs through state building aid the following year.





## **Voting Information**

### ***The 2025-2026 Proposed Budget Budget and Board of Education Election***

#### **Proposition #1 - Proposed Budget**

The budget proposition would authorize the appropriation of \$14,194,347. to meet estimated school district expenditures for the 2025-2026 school year. This represents an increase of 0.50% compared to the 2024-2025 adopted budget. Adoption of this budget would result in anticipated tax levy increase of 2.3% which is within the limits of property tax cap as calculate within the accordance with Chapter 97 of the Laws of New York and qualifying homes will be eligible for the state's Star rebate.

#### **Proposition #2 - Bus Purchase**

The bus purchase proposition seeks voter approval to purchase two (2) new 65-passenger Blue Bird gas buses at an estimated cost of \$394,701 to be used in the transportation program of the District.

#### **Board of Education Election**

Voters will elect one member to the Board of Education. One at-large vacancy will be filled on the Board of Education by reason of expiration of the term of office of one incumbent. The one candidate receiving the largest number of votes shall be elected to a four-year term to commence on July 1, 2025, and expiring on June 30, 2029.

#### **Voter Registration Reminder**

1. A citizen of the U. S.
2. Eighteen years of age or older and;
3. A resident of the Forestville Central School District for a period of 30 days or more preceding the annual vote and election.

#### **Military Voters**

Applications for qualified miliary voters will be available from the District Clerk's Office. The District Clerk must receive a valid ballot application no later than 5:00 p.m. on April 25, 2025. The voter may designate a preference to receive the application or ballot by mail, facsimile or electronic mail.

#### **Absentee Ballot Procedures**

Absentee ballots for the Budget Vote and Board Member Election will be available by application to the District Clerk's Office for any qualified voter who will be unable to vote in person due to illness or physical disability, hospitalization, incarceration (unless incarcerated for conviction of a felony), or travel outside the District for employment or business reasons, studies or vacation on the day of the vote/ election.

Applications for absentee ballots will be available from the District Clerk's Office on or after April 25, 2025. Applications must be received by the District Clerk by May 15, 2025 to be processed by mail or by 3:30 p.m. on May 20, 2025, in person. Absentee ballots must be received by the District Office, by mail or in person, prior to 5 p.m. on Tuesday, May 20, 2025 to be counted.

## **Proposition #3 - Anderson Lee Library Funding**

The Anderson Lee Library has approached the Forestville Central School District to request that a proposition be placed on our ballot for the school district voting day in May. This request is completely separate from the district budget being presented and voted on. This proposition will allow voters to decide whether or not to tax themselves to support the Anderson Lee Library. The school district is only responsible for placing the proposition on the ballot and, if approved by the voters, collecting the money and passing it along to the library. These funds are separate from the school tax levy funds and not part of the school district budget.



While the Anderson-Lee Library was chartered in 1924 on the basis of the Town of Hanover. In 2011 the chartered service area of the Library was changed by NYS to encompass both the Silver Creek School District and the Forestville School Districts. As of December 2022 that includes 9,915 people.

As your partners in the education of our youth, from the parents of preschoolers, who borrow books from the Library to promote reading readiness, to the teenager who borrows books and utilizes internet capabilities from the Library to do research for school projects, we compliment the classroom. Due to the fact, libraries lack taxing power of their own, our resources do not meet the needs of the community in terms of being able to effectively cover the costs of operation including library materials and hours of operation.


In that the State Legislature has provided public libraries with the privilege of going direct to local voters through a proposition on a school district budget ballot, for support funds collected along with the school tax levy, we are encouraged by a recent opinion of the State Comptroller that such a proposition does not require a lengthy petition of voters, but a straightforward request by the library board.

Accordingly, the trustees of the Anderson-Lee Library request that a proposition be placed on the 2025-2026 School District budget ballot seeking a levy of \$42,540 for operation of the Public Library. Such a levy, if passed by the voters, will remain in effect each year until a proposition for a change in the amount is submitted.

Throughout New York State, more than 98% of public library levys which are voted upon by the public tend to pass, with the margin of victory as much as 50 to 1. Libraries which have received these demonstrations of support claim that the presence of their proposition on the school budget ballot brings out more voters, voters who tend to also vote "yes" on the main school levy.

Therefore, we look forward to working with you as allies for the successful passage of our proposition on the upcoming budget ballot.

The league stats for these girls are: Carilene - 275 points, 66 rebounds, 6 blocks, 85 steals, and 35 assists. Elizabeth - 104 points, 122 rebounds, 3 blocks, 24 steals, and 30 assists. Ingrid - 74 points, 81 rebounds, 11 blocks, 17 steals, and 6 assists.

Not only were the girls successful on the basketball court, but they also excelled academically. The girls received a NYSPHSAA Scholar-Athlete Team Award for achieving academic excellence while actively participating in varsity level interscholastic athletics during the Winter 2025 Season. 

Not only does this provide a healthy challenge for students, but it may also help make their start in college a bit more affordable, as some of the college credits earned at Forestville are applied to their college education. In addition to the advanced-level coursework, we have added some very interesting elective courses for students to choose from. Lastly, as students transition to grade 11, opportunities for a vocational-like education are possible through the district's participation in Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs offered through Erie 2 BOCES Fredonia and Lake Shore Campuses.


## Engineering a Firemen's Drying Rack
